Extra! Extra! Read All About It!

- 1. We would like to thank all our Veterans and their families for the amazing sacrifices you have made for our country. Veterans Day Celebration: We are planning a small Veterans Day Celebration to honor our amazing men and women who have served or are currently serving in our military. On Monday, November 13th, we would like to invite any family members or relatives (immediate or distant) who are Veterans, into the school from 7:45 to 8:30 AM. Veterans will greet students as they enter the building, and we will be celebrating their service with some cards and posters.
- 2. Fall is well under way and temperatures are below freezing on some mornings. Physical Education classes and recess are outside when weather permits. Please be sure your child wears a coat and dresses appropriately for the weather.
- 3. We have a 3-Tiered Honor Roll System and will recognize students on the Honor Roll who have a grade point average (GPA) of 85.0 or higher. Students achieving a GPA of 85.0-89.99 will be recognized as Honor Roll, 90.0-94.99 will get High Honor Roll, and 95.0 or above will be recognized as Distinguished Honor Roll. To make any tier of Honor Roll, students cannot earn less than a 65 in any subject area. Special area classes (PE, art, and music) will be graded with an H (95 or higher), G (80 94.99), S (65 79.99), or U (below 65). These grades are not weighted into the overall average.
- 4. Applications for assistance from the Arctic League were sent home with students and are also available in the Social Worker's Office. Please call the school for more information.
- 5. Math Facts—Memorization of math facts is critical for student success at this grade level. Math facts are essential for students as they study higher level math concepts. The Intermediate School would like to see ALL students testing at 100% on their math facts by the end of this school year. Your child may borrow a set of math facts cards. We ask that you or someone in your family help your child to study these math facts cards and then return them to their homeroom teachers. Practice will pay off!
- 6. We are encouraging our students to wash their hands often with soap and water. Hand sanitizer is available in all classrooms. We want to inform you that the District will be maintaining this during the year.



STUDENTS READ THREE BOOKS A MONTH

Our District has established the standard that 5th and 6th grade students will read a minimum of 25 books on their reading level or roughly 4 thousand pages, by the end of the year. We need your help to encourage your child to reach this goal by reading 3 books per month. Children whose parents read with them on a regular basis are more successful in school.



CIM TEAM

Our School District currently is utilizing the CIM (Classroom Intervention Model) in assuring your child is receiving all necessary supports to have a positive school vear. The CIM Team is a collaborative approach which includes teachers. administrators. special education staff, school psychologist, social workers and other staff with knowledge or specific skills. Our goal is to discuss, confidentially, any student's needs and to develop an Intervention Plan that will help him/her be more successful. You, as the parent/quardian, can be involved in the process to help make this a joint effort between home and school. If you have any questions regarding this team, please consult with vour student's classroom teacher.



ACADEMIC INTERVENTION SERVICES (AIS)

The New York State Education Department mandates that all schools identify and provide academic assistance to any student falling below designated cutoff various a on assessments. AIS stands Academic for Intervention Services. Identified students will be monitored and will receive additional help, which continues until the student demonstrates competency in the identified area. Students in need are identified throughout various data points including, but not limited to, classroom assessments. Aimsweb benchmark Plus. assessments, screeners, state exams, and teacher recommendations.

Horseheads Central School District Parents' Bill of Rights Relating to Student Data

The Horseheads District, in compliance with Education Law 2-d, hereby establishes the following Parents' Bill of Rights in regard to student data:

- 1. A student's personally identifiable information will not be sold or released for any commercial purpose;
- 2. Parents have the right to inspect and review the complete contents of their child's educational record. Procedures for reviewing student records can be found in the Board Policy entitled "Student Records," Policy 5500, Regulation 5500-R;
- 3. Security protocols regarding confidentiality of personally identifiable information are currently in place and the safeguards necessary to protect the confidentiality of student data are maintained at industry standards and best practices. The safeguards include but are not limited to encryption, firewalls, and password protection.
- 4. New York State maintains a complete list of all student data collected by the State and the data is available for public review at www.nysed.gov, or by writing to 89 Washington Avenue, Albany, NY 12234
- 5. Parents have the right to have complaints about possible breaches of student data addressed. Complaints should be directed to the Superintendent of Schools, 143 Hibbard Road, Horseheads, NY 14845.

INFORMATION REGARDING VACCINATION REQUIREMENTS!



PLEASE READ THIS VERY IMPORTANT INFORMATION FROM THE HEALTH OFFICE

Dear Current Fifth Grade Parents/Guardians:

By the start of the 2024 school year, all 6th grade students will need to receive <u>2 doses</u> of the Varicella (Chicken Pox) vaccination along with the Tdap vaccine. The laws are very strict, and we cannot allow students to come to school after the first 10 days of school without these immunizations.

Your child may get the required immunization through your health care provider, Five Star Urgent, or Walk-In Clinics. The Chemung County Health Department may be utilized by appointment if you qualify based on criteria. (607) 737-2028.

You must provide proof that your child has received the Tdap immunization in order for your child to attend school in the fall. Your health care provider or health department will provide you with this written proof once your child receives the immunization. Please bring this proof to our Health Office or fax it to us at 795-2495. **No appointment cards accepted.**

<u>Please note:</u> 10-year-old students who are entering 6th grade will not be required to receive the Tdap vaccine at this time and will not be excluded from school but will be tracked and must be immunized upon turning 11 years old.

HEALTH CORNER



It is that time of the year again to remember good health practices. Please keep your child home if he/she has had a temperature of 100 degrees or higher, vomiting or diarrhea in the past 24 hours. Because there is no known cure for the common cold, prevention is the key to keeping colds away. Most of the time you acquire a cold virus by touching your eyes, nose or mouth with an object that has the cold virus on it. Therefore, to help avoid catching a cold:

- Wash hands thoroughly and frequently with warm soapy water.
- Sneeze into a tissue, rather than your hands, then discard the tissue (*Remember to please send in tissue boxes)
- Don't touch your face—your hands may have come in contact with a cold virus!
- Drink 8 glasses of water daily.
- Get plenty of rest—up to 12 hours a night!

Please be considerate of others—you are contagious for the first three days when cold symptoms appear.

Fight Flu

at Home and School

Influenza (flu), spreads easily and can make people very sick, especially kids. You can help stop flu!

Flu symptoms include:

Fever or chills, body aches, cough, sore throat, headache, runny or stuffy nose, feeling very tired. Some people, especially children, may have stomach problems and diarrhea. Unlike a cold, the flu comes on very suddenly.

Prevent flu!

- Flu vaccine is the best protection against the flu. It is recommended every year for everyone 6 months and older.
- Get the flu vaccine for you and your children every year! It helps make flu sickness milder or prevents it altogether.
- Getting the vaccine early in the fall means you and your children will be protected when flu season starts.
- Make sure people close to your children, like babysitters and relatives, are also vaccinated.
- The vaccine is especially important for people with certain medical conditions like asthma, diabetes, and heart or lung disease, because the flu can make them even sicker.

If your child gets the flu:

- Your child will need plenty of rest and lots of fluids.
- Keep your child home from school for at least 24 hours after their fever is gone without using fever-control medicine. This helps avoid giving the flu to others
- Talk with your child's health care provider before giving a child any over-the-counter medicine.
- Never give your child or teenager aspirin or any medicine that has aspirin
 in it. Aspirin can cause serious problems for children and teens.
- Young children and those with certain medical conditions, like asthma, diabetes, and heart or lung disease, are at greater risk for getting seriously ill from the flu.
- If your child gets flu symptoms and is younger than 5 or has a medical condition, call their health care provider and ask about antiviral treatment.
- . If you are worried about your child, call their health care provider.

Don't spread flu!

- Wash hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.
- . If soap and water aren't handy, use an alcohol-based hand rub.
- Cough or sneeze into a tissue or your elbow, not your hands. Put used tissues in the trash.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth. That's how germs spread.
- Stay away from people who are sick.



What is the census?

The Horseheads Central School District regularly conducts a district-wide census. This year's census is especially important because the information we receive will assist us in developing elementary school boundary lines as we shift to three elementary schools - Big Flats, Gardner Road, and Ridge Road - at the start of the 2025-26 school year.

Why is Center Street Elementary closing?

After careful consideration of the educational experience of our students and the state of our buildings, the district made the decision to move to three elementary schools. The community supported this plan with the passing of the referendum on December 7, 2021. As one of the oldest buildings in the district, Center Street would require significant construction to upgrade the building to current state standards for an educational space for students. The building is safe for students as it is now, but any additional construction would require asbestos and lead abatement, incurring significant costs that would not be completely covered through state aid. The plan approved by voters includes phasing out Center Street for student use, but keeping the building for district offices and community use.

Which school will my child attend?

The district is working with a demographer to redraw the elementary school attendance boundary lines from four buildings to three. Your response on this census assists the demographer team with redrawing more balanced boundary lines that send students to the school closest to home when possible. A decision regarding the new boundary lines is expected by Summer 2024.
