Dear Parents and Guardians,

The month of October not only brings cooler temperatures and beautiful landscapes, it also brings our staff and students, consistent routines and safety procedures. Each year we are required by New York State to complete 8 fire drills throughout the school year, as well as four quarterly lock-down drills. This year, we are also be completing our Off-Site Evacuation Drill, which will be to The Bridge (Wesleyan Church) next door to our school. Last week, we practiced the annual Emergency Go Home Drill. Each year, we ask parents to complete the Emergency Go Home form in case we have an emergency and need to send all K-4 students home by bus. These situations do arise occasionally and that is why we need to know where your child (ren) are to go in case of a situation that would prevent parents from picking up their child at school.

This month, we will be completing our first lock-down drill. Lock-down drills are mandatory and we will complete one drill each quarter. The purpose of these drills is to teach our students and staff how best to protect themselves in case of an intruder or an emergency outside our school, somewhere out in our community. It is very important for parents to remind their children that school is a very safe place for them to be and that their teachers and Mrs. Scaptura will do everything they can to keep them safe but in order to do so, if they see or hear something that is not safe, then they need to tell an adult as soon as possible.

Lastly, every month of October, we support Unity Day. This year, Unity Day is Wednesday, October 19th, 2022, and it is a day that we all come together and wear orange to stop bullying! Each year, during my annual September Town Hall meetings, I share with our students the importance of knowing the difference between conflict and bullying. We also discuss how important it is to Stand Up and Be a Kid Against Bullying! We talked about the importance of saying something to an adult on duty if they see or hear any kind of bullying. If we are in the cafeteria, we tell the lunch monitors. If we see or hear something on the bus, we tell the bus driver. If we see or hear bullying on the playground we tell the closest teacher. We stand up, reach out and be a friend to anyone who is being teased, bullied or being excluded from others. Please send your child (ren) to school wearing orange on October 19th , 2022 in support of our Unity Day!

FRIENDLY REMINDERS:

• Changes in Going Home Routine/Bus Notes Please remember to write a 'blue note' with your child's change in dismissal plans if he/she will not be following their normal routine. Blue notes should also be written to explain your child's tardiness, absence, or plan to leave early. This is extremely important for the safety of our students.

• Half Days for Elementary Schools

There will be no lunch and no Kid's World provided on half days at elementary schools. <u>Dismissal</u> will be at 10:30am for Pre-K and 11:00am for K-4. Please send a blue note on these days with dismissal plans for your student if he/she usually attends Kid's World.

• Please Always Park in the Parking Lot

When visiting the school, either with a late student/early pick up, dropping something off, attending a meeting, etc., please always park in the parking lot and not the bus lane. All visitors must report to the office, and the office will further assist you.



This year at Big Flats Elementary, our school will be implementing the Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports (PBIS) model with our school community. PBIS is an evidencebased framework that supports students' behavioral, academic, social-emotional, and mental health needs. Not only does PBIS improve competence in the areas mentioned above, but also provides a shared vision for a positive school social culture for staff and students. As the school year progresses, we hope you might hear your child (ren) share with you our Big Flats Core 4 to SOAR, a collaboration of expectations created by students and staff to foster a positive school climate for all. These four expectations serve as a foundation for positive and proactive support to empower and make students and staff feel safe, valued, and welcome. School and Emergency Closings

School closings/delays due to inclement weather will be announced via various media outlets such as WNKI, WPGI, Magic FM, and WELM radio stations, and WENY, WETM, and Time Warner Cable News on TV. In the event of an emergency during the school day, all students will be taken by bus to the address previously identified by parents on the "Emergency Go Home" form that was completed at the beginning of the school year. As a reminder, this location MUST be on one of the Big Flats Elementary bus routes.

Fight Flu at Home and School

Flu, or influenza, spreads easily and can make people very sick, especially kids. You can help stop flu!

Flu symptoms include:

Fever or chills, body aches, cough, sore throat, headache, runny or stuffy nose, feeling very tired. Some people, especially children, may have stomach problems and diarrhea. Unlike a cold, the flu comes on very suddenly.

Prevent flu!

- Flu vaccine is the best protection against the flu. It is recommended every year for everyone 6 months and older.
- Get the flu vaccine for you and your children every year! It helps make flu sickness milder or prevents it all together.
- Getting the vaccine early in the fall means you and your children will be protected when flu season starts.
- Ask people close to your children, like babysitters and relatives, to get the vaccine, too.
- The vaccine is especially important for people with certain health conditions, like asthma, diabetes, heart or lung conditions because the flu can make them even sicker.

If your child gets the flu:

- Your child will need plenty of rest and lots of fluids.
- Keep your child home from school for at least 24 hours after their fever is gone without using fever-control medicine. This helps avoid giving the flu to others.
- Talk with your child's health care provider before giving a child any overthe-counter medicine.
- Never give your child or teenager aspirin or any medicine that has aspirin in it. Aspirin can cause serious problems.
- If your child gets flu symptoms and is younger than 5 or has a medical condition like asthma, diabetes, or heart or lung disease, call their health care provider. Young children and those with certain medical conditions are at greater risk for getting seriously ill from the flu. Ask their health care provider if they recommend an antiviral drug.
- If you are worried about your child, call their health care provider.

Don't spread flu!

- Wash hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.
- If soap and water aren't handy, use an alcohol-based hand rub.
- Cough or sneeze into a tissue or your elbow, not your hands. Put used tissues in the trash.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth. That's how germs spread.
- Stay away from people who are sick.
