Drill Notifications:

As you are aware, throughout the school year Big Flats Elementary will practice important emergency response procedures for our school including fire, evacuation, lockdown, and emergency dismissal drills. Families will receive notice within one week prior to drills. Please be advised we will continue practicing our mandated drills. It's hard to believe that October is already here! We've had a wonderful start to what we hope will be an incredible school year for our Big Flats Falcons.

Next week, we will practice our annual emergency go-home drill. This is a regional drill conducted each year to prepare for emergency school closures, during which ALL students would be bussed to their designated emergency go-home locations. Please note that on emergency closure days, there will be no parent pickups– all students will be bussed home. This is an essential drill for ALL students, especially those who are usually dropped off or picked up, as it familiarizes them with their assigned emergency bus, bus driver, and fellow students. During this drill students will board their designated bus, attendance will be taken and then they will deboard the bus. At no point during this drill will the students leave Big Flats campus. At the conclusion of the drill, students will return to their classrooms for regular end of day dismissal.

Additionally, October is Bullying Prevention Month. Each September, I hold town meetings with all students to review school expectations and our zero-tolerance policy for bullying. We also discuss the important distinction between conflict and bullying. On October 16th, we encourage all students and staff to wear orange in solidarity as we take a stand against bullying. I kindly ask that you take a moment to speak with your children and remind them that if they ever feel they are being bullied, they should inform an adult immediately. Your support is invaluable, and together we can help prevent bullying and ensure a safe, supportive environment for all our students.

I also want to remind you that our Open House has been rescheduled to **Monday, October 7th, from 6:30 to 7:30 PM**. We're looking forward to seeing you there to meet our teachers, visit the classrooms, and celebrate the beginning of a wonderful school year together.

FRIENDLY REMINDERS:

• Changes in Going Home Routine/Bus Notes Please remember to write a 'blue note' with your child's change in dismissal plans if he/she will not be following their normal routine. Blue notes should also be written to explain your child's tardiness, absence, or plan to leave early. This is extremely important for the safety of our students. All dismissal changes should be submitted no later than 12:00.

• Half Days for Elementary Schools There will be no lunch and no Kid's World provided on half days at elementary schools. Please send a blue note on these days with dismissal plans for your student if he/she usually attends Kid's World.

• Please Always Park in the Parking Lot

When visiting the school, either with a late student/early pick up, dropping something off, attending a meeting, etc., please always park in the parking lot and not the bus lane. All visitors must report to the office, and the office will further assist you.

• Snow Days Impact our Schedule

When a snow day occurs and all schools in the District are closed, it changes our six-day schedule. The next day that school is in session is the cycle day that the snow day would have been. Big Flats continues to implement the Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports (PBIS) model with our school community. PBIS is an evidence-based

framework that supports students' behavioral, academic, social-emotional, and mental health needs. Not only does PBIS improve competence in the areas mentioned above, but also provides a shared vision for a positive school social culture for staff and students. As the school year progresses, we hope you might hear your child(ren) share with you our Big Flats Core 4 to SOAR, a collaboration of expectations created by students and staff to foster a positive school climate for all.

These four expectations serve as a foundation for positive and proactive support to empower and make students and staff feel safe, valued, and welcome. We appreciate your continued support in helping us soar together!

School and Emergency Closings

School closings/delays due to inclement weather will be announced via various media outlets such as WNKI, WPGI, Magic FM, and WELM radio stations, and WENY, WETM, and Time Warner Cable News on TV. You may also opt in to our text messaging services through SchoolMessenger by texting Yes to 67587. In the event of an emergency during the school day, all students will be taken by bus to the address previously identified by parents on the "Emergency Go Home" form that was completed at the beginning of the school year. As a reminder, this location MUST be on one of the Big Flats Elementary bus routes.

Please note that students are **not** to come to school in costume—this includes make-up and colored hair. All costumes must be non-threatening, and no toy weapons are allowed. Visitors are NOT allowed to wear costumes, and only pre-approved parent-helpers will be allowed into the building to assist teachers with costumes. The parade will be held outside. In the event of rain, the parade will be canceled and will not be rescheduled. To ensure the safety of our students, we ask that all visitors please remain behind the yellow caution tape while watching the parade.

Fight Flu at Home and School

Influenza (flu), spreads easily and can make people very sick, especially kids. You can help stop flu!

Flu symptoms include:

Fever or chills, body aches, cough, sore throat, headache, runny or stuffy nose, feeling very tired. Some people, especially children, may have stomach problems and diarrhea. Unlike a cold, the flu comes on very suddenly.

Prevent flu!

- Flu vaccine is the best protection against the flu. It is recommended every year for everyone 6 months and older.
- Get the flu vaccine for you and your children every year! It helps make flu sickness milder or prevents it altogether.
- Getting the vaccine early in the fall means you and your children will be protected when flu season starts.
- Make sure people close to your children, like babysitters and relatives, are also vaccinated.
- The vaccine is especially important for young children and people of all ages with certain health conditions like asthma, diabetes, and heart or lung conditions. The flu can make them even sicker.

If your child gets the flu:

- Your child will need plenty of rest and lots of fluids.
- Keep your child home from school for at least 24 hours after their fever is gone without using fever-control medicine. This helps avoid giving the flu to others.
- Talk with your child's health care provider before giving a child any over-the-counter medicine.
- Never give your child or teenager aspirin or any medicine that has aspirin in it. Aspirin can cause serious problems.
- Young children and those with certain medical conditions, like asthma, diabetes, and heart or lung disease, are at greater risk for getting seriously ill from the flu.
- If your child gets flu symptoms, call their health care provider and ask if antiviral treatment is right for them.
- If you are worried about your child, call their health care provider.

Don't spread flu!

• Stay home if you are sick.

• Stay away from people who are sick.

- Wash hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.
- If soap and water aren't handy, use an alcohol-based hand rub.
- Cough or sneeze into a tissue or your elbow, not your hands. Put used tissues in the trash.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth. That's how germs spread.
