Setting Goals

he middle of the school year is a great time for families to check in with students on goals. Setting academic and personal goals helps motivate, energize, and focus students, and it is a valuable skill that will benefit learners throughout their lives. Parents can help students set and achieve these goals.

Goal-setting can be tedious, even intimidating, for some students. Parents can support students in this process by following these steps: pick it, map it, do it, own it, and celebrate it.

Pick it. Encourage your child to consider his or her dreams and passions and pick goals that are important and meaningful. Guide your child to think about, "What motivates me? What would inspire me to give my best effort? What would make me feel good while I'm doing it? What achievement would make me feel proud?"

Map it. After your child picks a goal, help map the path from

where he or she is now to where the child wants to be. Offer the following analogy: If we want to drive across the country from New York to California, we don't just get in our car and start driving—we get a map, pick a route, and follow it until we get to California.

With your child, analyze different approaches and define clear steps to reach their goal. For instance, if the goal is to get a higher test grade in a tough subject, each quiz or project is a step on the path to the higher goal: earning an A.


Do it. Once you and your child have mapped a path to their goal, encourage him or her to take action, focus on the first step and give it his or her best effort. Remind your child that no goal is ever reached without focused action.

Own it. As your child makes progress toward their goal, help him or her to take responsibility for making it happen. Teach the mantra, "If it's to be, it's up to me!"

Reflect with your child. Ask, "How are you doing? What's

working? What's not working? What can you or your family change to get to this goal?" From there, analyze the map, and make changes to the plan if necessary.

Help your child keep a positive attitude and own mistakes as well as successes. Remind your child that if something comes along that holds him or her back temporarily, to look at the experience as feedback. Failures, or bumps in the road, can provide us with information we need to succeed. Reinforce the message that we can learn from our mistakes and move on with new, valuable knowledge.



Try going through the goal-setting process as a family. Pick a family goal (perhaps a charitable activity) and work together to achieve it. After the family experience, have each family member pick a personal goal. Support and acknowledge one another as you move through the above steps.

Success is assured when students believe in themselves and in their ability to achieve. Parents are key to helping them believe and succeed.

Revisiting Familiar Topics - Spam & Phishing

Using Email is required of all Digital Citizens. Spam and Phishing continue to challenge us. Here are some more tips to help you understand and deal with Spam and Phishing.

Use these tips to minimize how much spam you receive.

- Try determine which messages are spam and avoid opening them. Also, avoid clicking on links in those messages.
- Don't be tempted to reply to spam messages. Just delete them and forget about them.
- · Don't buy anything from a spammer. You risk comprising your security and infecting your computer and you also reward and encourage the spammers.
- Avoid 'unsubscribe' options. Clicking them will confirm that your address is active and probably attract even more
- Be wary about giving out your main email address. If in doubt, it is a good idea to use a alternate (anonymous or free account) email address.
- Set up a disposable email address. Use some of the free email services to set up these accounts. If they start to receive a lot of spam you can just delete the account.
- · Don't reveal your email address on your website. Use a web contact form instead.

Don't be tricked by phishing attempts. Use these tips to help.

Phishing scams are messages that try to trick you into providing sensitive information. These often appear to come from a bank or another trusted source, and they'll usually want you to enter a password, verify a birth date, or confirm a credit card number. Phishing messages may look real enough at first glance, because it's surprisingly easy for scammers to create convincing details.

- · Scammers often create websites and email addresses that use slight variations of the real address such as bankofamercan.com rather than bankofamerica.com.
- Fraudulent emails often use subject lines that look important and show concern for your safety. Who wouldn't be concerned about an alert on a bank account!
- Be suspicious. Just because what you are seeing looks identical to an official logo, doesn't make it authentic.
- · Phishing scams often suggest that failure to respond immediately will result in negative consequences, like a freeze on your bank account.

In today's society, it is important to recognize that our students are connecting with the world in a different way. The Educators at ECSD are embracing the power that technology can have in order to engage today's students in this digital age. Literacy has been an important initiative in the Elmira City School District. As a result, the district has invested in some new interactive technologies for engaging today's learners in the area of literacy. The newest of these programs that are being implemented throughout ECSD include: **iRead** (Grades K-2), **Read180** and **System 44** (Grades 3-10), and **Newsela** (Grades 3-12).

Teachers have been engaged in numerous trainings across the district on using computer-based programming to successfully implement **Tier 2 literacy instruction**. Teachers have been provided trainings which have provided them with access to webinars, resources, and trainings greatly expanding their understanding of the programming.

Teachers have received training in using the Read180, System 44 and iRead platforms. These platforms provide students with individually tailored learning opportunities that specifically target their learning needs. Helping teachers understand the ways that they can effectively use this program to drive instruction and support student needs has been a paramount focus of the Elmira City School District.

Additionally, ECSD's Supervisor of School Innovation, Alicia Bubb has been working to provide professional development support with **Newsela** and its integration with the district LMS, **Schoology**. She has coordinated even more offerings and support with the utilization of BOCES Instructional Support Teachers as well as ECSD Teacher Leaders.






