NO CHILD LEFT BEHIND ACT - OPTING OUT

The federal No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 and the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 require that all schools receiving federal funding must provide student information to military recruiters and institutions of higher learning unless parents opt out in writing. Students who are 18 years of age or older may also opt out of this requirement. 988 FAQ





What is 988?



988 is the new three-digit number that connects people to the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline. This service is for anyone who is:

- suicidal
- experiencing a mental health or substance use-related crisis
- experiencing any kind of emotional distress

988 is more than just a number. It is a direct connection to compassionate and accessible care. When you call, text, or chat 988 you are connected to trained counselors that are part of the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline network. Moving to 988 does not mean the 1-800-273-8255 number goes away. Using either number will get people to the same services.

Why do we need 988?



Mental health is just as important as physical health. Now there is a three-digit number for mental health emergencies that's easy to remember! 988 helps New York:

- Connect with people who are struggling with behavioral health (mental health and/or substance use) concerns as soon as possible, 24/7.
- Reduce unnecessary use of law enforcement and other safety resources in crisis responses.
- Meet the growing need for crisis intervention where it's needed most.
- Shift the mindset about people who struggle with their mental health.
- Reduce healthcare spending with more costeffective early intervention.

Will services be offered in other languages?



The Lifeline currently provides live crisis center phone services in English and Spanish and uses Language Line Solutions to provide translation services in over 150 additional languages.

Does it cost money to use 988?

Contacting 988 is a free service.

Who can contact 988?



988 is for everyone and it's more than a 'suicide' line. Contact 988 if you are:

- suicidal
- experiencing a mental health or substance userelated crisis
- experiencing any kind of emotional distress
- worried about someone in distress.

988 is for people of all ages, genders, sexes, ethnicities, races, religions, sexual orientations, and socioeconomic statuses. If you are a Veteran or Spanish speaker, 988 has dedicated lines for you.

What happens when I contact 988?



When contacting 988, you will first be routed to a local Lifeline crisis center based on your area code. A trained crisis counselor will answer and listen to how your problem is affecting you. They then provide support and share resources if needed. If a local crisis center is unable to take the call, you will be automatically routed to a national backup crisis center. All contact with 988 is voluntary.

What is the difference between 988 and 911?



988 provides easy access to the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline network and related crisis resources. This is different from 911, where the focus is on dispatching Emergency

Medical Services, fire, and police as needed. The goal of 988 is to meet the growing suicide and mental healthrelated crisis care needs.

HEALTH OFFICE NEWS

SCREENS

Per New York State, all 11th graders and new entrants to the school district are required to have hearing and near and distance vision screened. This will occur during the end of September/beginning of October.

New York State requires all 9th grade boys to be screened for scoliosis. This will occur during the end of September/beginning of October.

SCHOOL PHYSICALS

School physicals, done by a Guthrie provider, will be scheduled for one day during the month of November. A school physical is provided if your child does not have a primary care provider.

SPORTS

Saturday, October 15th, Varsity and Junior Varsity registration for winter sports opens on Family ID. Varsity and Junior Varsity winter sports tryouts begin on Monday, November 14th. Each athlete must submit a physical to the Health Office (if not already on file) that is dated on or after November 1, 2021.

2022 - 2023 HEALTH EXAMINATION REQUIREMENTS

As of July 1, 2018, New York State law requires a health examination for all students **entering a school district for the first time and when entering 9th and 11th grade.** The examination must be completed by a New York State licensed physician, physician assistant, or nurse practitioner.

- A copy of the health examination must be provided to the school within 30 days from when your child first starts at the school and when your child starts 9th and 11th grades. If a copy is not given to the school within 30 days, the school will contact you.
- If your child has an appointment for an exam during this school year that is after the first 30 days of school, please notify the Health Office with the date.
- Communication between private and school health staff is important for safe and effective care at school. Your healthcare provider may not share health information with school health staff without your signed permission. Please talk to your provider about signing their consent form for the school at the time of your child's appointment for the examination.
- We suggest that you make a copy of the completed forms for your own records before sending them to the school health office. Forms may be emailed or faxed to the nurse. Please see our contact information below.

~Dr. Seuss Oh, The Places You'll Go High school is a journey that will lead you to your future career and adult life. Like any trip, it requires planning, direction and patience.

In order to graduate from high school, you must successfully complete three criteria set by New York State: Courses, Credits, and Exams. You must take required courses, you must earn at least 23 high school credits, and you must pass required Regents exams. This passport includes a diploma requirement worksheet to help in your planning and preparation. Your middle school counselor will assist you in selecting your ninth grade coursework in the spring of your eighth grade year. You will meet each spring with a high school counselor in ninth, tenth and eleventh grade to select courses for the following years.

As you select courses, you should think about where will your journey take you? Do you want to enter the workforce after high school? Do you want to enter college or the military? Part of your meetings with your school counselor will help you in deciding your route and what can help you reach your goals.

Your route isn't just about the classes you take from 7:50am to 3:02pm every day. It is about the things you do besides being a student. Be involved in your school and community. Explore to find out what you are passionate about. Everything you do helps you along the road!

In your journey you will meet many people. The relationships will be important. Your journey will surely hit a few speed bumps, but the road will be smother if you take responsibility for yourself and show respect for both yourself and others.

Your journey may seem long now, but it will fly by like the blink of an eye when you look back. One of the best things you can do is to show up! Be present and enjoy the moments.

How to Avoid Roadblocks and Detours (Habits of Successful Students)

- 1. **Get organized.** Make a plan of what you are going to do and when you have to do it. Keep a calendar with what is due in a place where you will see it EVERY DAY!
- 2. **Don't multitask.** Focus on one task to complete it before moving onto the next. This will help so you don't feel so overwhelmed at one time.
- 3. **Divide it up.** Break your work into manageable chunks. Take a break between working on things to give your brain and body a little rest. Study a little bit every day rather than trying to do it all in one sitting.
- 4. **Sleep.** You will be better able to focus in school and on your work if you get enough sleep at night. The day can be long if you are tired and cranky from staying up too late scrolling on TikTok!
- 5. **Set a schedule.** Find a schedule to study that works for you and stick to it! Do you do best when you sit down for homework right after school or after you take some down time? (Hint: your best won't be at 9, 10 or 11pm at night!)
- 6. **Take notes.** Taking notes helps keep you engaged in class. It also helps you learn the material that is required. If you are struggling to take notes, ask your teacher (before or after class) for help.
- 7. **Show up!** Attendance is important—especially with the block schedule. If you miss school, it is hard to catch up. Make sure to request work if you are out.
- 8. **Take responsibility for you.** We all make mistakes. It is how we handle those mistakes that matter. Choose to take ownership for how you do in classes. Your grades are a reflection of the work you put into any class.
