What's a fishmonger, you ask? A person who sells fish of course! In 1930s Seattle, Washington, a fishmarket stall opened at the Pike Place Market. The Pike Place Fish Company served its customers well for decades. When former employee, now owner, John Yokoyama, began to stir the pot, he found a better way for his employees to enjoy their job. The self-proclaimed World Famous Pike Place Fish Market became known as the place where the fishmongers threw fish — literally! The fishmongers put on a show that the customers loved. They would throw whole fish across their stall, sometimes to the customer. Each transaction became a positive, uplifting experience for everyone. The fish market became one of Seattle's top tourist attractions. How did this happen? Fish Philosophy, of course.

The workers there found that four basic principles were their key to success:

Be there in the moment (for their customers)

# HMS Emergency Response Plan

The Horseheads Middle School Building Safety Team has created a multi-faceted response plan for potentially dangerous situations. Our plan is aligned with The Horseheads School District Safety Plan and is developed with the latest information related to school safety. Our teams are trained and committed to ensuring students and staff remain safe at school. Cooperating with local first responders is essential for building safety. Therefore, our building safety plan is reviewed, updated and shared with local first responders on an annual basis.

### **EMERGENCY DRILLS**

Drills are held at regular intervals throughout the school year. Students must listen and follow the directions given by their teacher or school official. Students will be trained throughout the year in building safety procedures.

Reinforce the importance of all safety drills with your students. Paying attention and following directions are crucial for everyone's safety.

# **MIDDLE SCHOOL SAFETY AND SECURITY**

Safety for our students, staff, and community is a top priority. All visitors must come to the middle school main entrance and press a buzzer to alert the Main Office. Visitors will state their purpose for being at the school, and must be let in by the school's Main Office secretaries.

### **Reporting Potential Safety Concerns**

We provide a safe and confidential way for Middle School students or their parents to report threats of violence, suicide and any illegal activity that could harm students in our school. Information will go directly to the attention of Administration. Each report will be handled and confidentiality maintained. All students will be assigned a gaggle account.

New York State's Dignity for All Students Act (The Dignity Act) seeks to provide the State's public elementary and secondary school students with a safe and supportive environment free from discrimination, intimidation, taunting, harassment, and bullying on school property, a school bus and/or at a school function.

### The Horseheads School District Code of Conduct describes harassment as follows:

DIGNITY FOR ALL STUDENTS ACT

"Harassment" and/or "bullying" means an intentional act against any student, on school property or at a school function, that creates a hostile environment by conduct, with or without physical contact by verbal threats, intimidation or abuse, including cyberbullying of such a severe nature that it:

- has or would have the effect of unreasonably and substantially interfering with a student's educational performance, opportunities or benefits, or mental, emotional or physical well-being; or
- reasonably causes or would reasonably be expected to cause a student to fear for his or her physical safety.
- reasonably causes or would reasonably be expected to cause physical injury or emotional harm to a student; or
- occurs off school property and creates or would foreseeably create a risk of substantial disruption within the school environment, where it is foreseeable that the conduct, threats, intimidation or abuse might reach school property.

"Emotional Harm" that takes place in the context of harassment or bullying shall be defined as harm to a student's emotional well-being through creation of a hostile school environment that is so severe or pervasive as to unreasonably and substantially interfere with a student's education. Such conduct shall include, but is not limited to, acts based on a person's actual or perceived race, color, weight, national origin, ethnic group, religion, religious practice, disability, sexual orientation, gender or sex.



Acts of harassment and bullying shall include, but not be limited to, those acts based upon a person's actual or perceived race, color, weight, national origin, ethnic group, religion, religious practice, disability, sexual orientation, gender or sex.

At Horseheads Middle School, harassment is not tolerated. Section B of the Prohibited Student Conduct, as listed in the Student Handbook's Code of Conduct, students are subject to disciplinary sanctions. Students will not engage in any conduct that endangers the safety, morals and health and welfare of others.

### EMOTIONAL HEALTH SCREENINGS AVAILABLE FOR ALL CHEMUNG COUNTY YOUTH AGES 4-21

It is important to regularly check on your child's emotional health. A child who does not feel well emotionally can become physically sick; physical illness can affect emotional health. In any event, it is more difficult for a child who does not feel well to be interested in going to school or succeeding in school. When emotional health concerns are dealt with early, we can help young people get the most out of their education and lead happy, productive lives.

Good emotional health leads to good relationships, good decisions, an ability to deal with life's challenges, an interest in school and improved physical health.

Emotional health issues can affect school performance, physical health, personal relationships and actions toward others.

Completing an emotional health screening is a simple effective way to look at a child's emotional development. To participate in the screening, complete a consent form and the emotional health screening for your child. # Helping to Develop the "Filter Between The Ears"

Attorney and child advocate **Parry Aftab** advises that parents work on developing their child's "filter between the ears." Some general guidelines:

- Limit kids' leisure time online to under an hour and a half a day, including time spent textmessaging via cell phone.
- Talk to kids about the dangers of offline meetings with strangers who have contacted them via the Internet.
- Use software to filter inappropriate sites for young teens.
- Keep young kids off social networks and dating sites.
- Consider giving kids more leeway on the friends they can accept on chat, IM, or as email buddies, but ensure that you know their offline identities. No friends of friends.
- Filter or block image searches, which can be a way around many filters.
- Block peer-to-peer technologies and teach kids not to download pirated software, movies or music.
- Password theft is a problem at this age, so teach kids to guard passwords.
- Try to keep the computer in a central location, and watch kids' behavior with interactive devices such as cell phones and interactive gaming gadgets like Xbox Live. If these devices include parental controls, as Xbox Live does, use the controls. But be aware that even with the controls in place, these games can be risky for young teens because they enable users to chat with strangers.

# Parents' Bill of Rights for Data Privacy and Security

- 1. The parent/guardian or eligible student has a right to:
- 2. inspect and review the student's education records;
- 3. request that records be amended to ensure that they are not inaccurate, misleading, or otherwise in violation of the student's privacy rights;
- 4. consent to disclosure of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) authorizes disclosure without consent; and
- 5. file a complaint with the United States Department of Education alleging failure of the district to comply with FERPA and its regulations. Complaints may be sent to Family Policy Compliance Office, U.S. Department of Education, 600 Independence Avenue SW, Washington, DC 20202-4605.

# **Parking Lot Safety**

Due to the large volume of students being dropped off in the morning, the drop-off line can become very long. We ask that you help alleviate unnecessary wait time by following these simple procedures:

- Utilize the entire drop-off lane. Please do not wait until you have pulled up to the Middle School main entrance to drop off your students. Approximately 10 cars can drop off students simultaneously. Please stay in line.
- Students should exit the vehicle as soon as it is safely stopped. Please be sure students have all of their belongings ready to go.
- Do not drop students off on the road.
- Students should be exiting the car no later than 7:40. This will allow them to arrive in their 1st period class by the 7:45 tardy bell. Drop off early, the closer to 7:40 you get, the more traffic you will experience.

aimsweb Plus is a reliable computer-based screening assessment, which is administered in the fall, winter and spring. Beginning September 16th, students will be taking the fall aimsweb Plus benchmark assessments in reading and math. aimsweb Plus allows us to monitor our students in reading and math and provides us with valuable information we can use to make educational decisions for our students. Results will be shared with parents and students three times per year. Our goal is for each student to demonstrate academic growth from fall to winter and winter to spring. No special preparation for the aimsweb Plus testing is required.

A report card is sent home with students at the end of the ten-week marking period. ### **Attendance Auto-call and Email**

To keep you updated regarding your child's attendance, the middle school will send you an autocall and email when your student(s) are absent from school. If a student is absent from first period, a call and email will be generated and delivered in the morning. If the student continues to be absent, another call will be generated and delivered in the evening with all of the periods the student has missed.



## **Information about Emergency School Closings and Delays**

Schools are closed when the weather makes it impossible to have reasonable attendance or when the schools or vehicles would not be able to operate safely. The school day is delayed when inclement weather conditions improve by early morning. Inclement weather may include snow, ice, and freezing temperatures. If the school day is delayed, buses will run and schools will open two hours later than the usual time.
