



BEFORE THE TALK

Know the facts

 Get credible information about e-cigarettes and young people at E-cigarettes. Surgeon General.gov

Be patient and ready to listen.

- · Avoid criticism and encourage an open dialogue.
- Remember, your goal is to have a conversation, not to deliver a lecture.
- It's OK for your conversation to take place over time, in bits and pieces.

Set a positive example by being tobacco-free.

 If you use tobacco, it's never too late to quit. For free help, visit smokefree.gov or call 1-800-QUIT-NOW.



KEEP THE CONVERSATION GOING

Many parents find that texting is a great way to reach their teens. Here are some suggestions for text messages that might acth your teers attention. And, you can easily share pages of the website (E-cigarettes SurgeonGeneral.gov) with your teen.



Look for this symbol, click it, type in the message you want or use the message provided, and share with your teen via Facebook, Twitter, or email.

Connect and encourage.

- You always liked science. Check out the science about e-cigarettes and young people.
 E-cigarettes.SurgeonGeneral.gov
- Getting off nicotine is hard but I'm so happy I quit. Don't make that mistake and get addicted.
 Smoking and tobacco use, including using e-cigarettes, are unsafe for young people.

Remind and repeat.

- Most teenagers don't use e-cigarettes. E-cigarettes with nicotine can mess with your brain, and your brain is still developing until you are at least 25.
- You might be tempted by e-cigarette flavors, but inhaling certain flavorings that have been found in some e-cigarettes can be harmful.

Share facts and resources.

- Just learned that many e-cigarettes have nicotine in them. That's the drug that makes cigarettes so addictive. Nicotine can also mess with your brain development.
- Just saw a report from the Surgeon General that e-cigarettes can mess with how your brain develops and might even affect your mood and focus. Please don't use any products that contain nicotine.
- Hope none of your friends use e-cigarettes around you. Even breathing the cloud they
 exhale can expose you to nicotine and chemicals that can be dangerous to your health.



Recently, numerous individuals from across the country have suffered severe lung damage linked to vaping.

Don't put off the conversation with your child.

 I don't say this to scare you, but I want you to have the facts because nothing is more important to me than your health and safety.

Aren't e-cigarettes safer than conventional cigarettes?

- Because your brain is still developing, scientific studies show that it isn't safe for you to use any tobacco product that contains nicotine, including e-cigarettes.
- Whether you get nicotine from an e-cigarette or a cigarette, it's still risky.
- Some e-cigarette batteries have even exploded and hurt neonle

I thought e-cigarettes didn't have nicotine – just water and flavoring?

- I used to think that too. But many e-cigarettes have nicotine. There are also other chemicals in them that can be harmful.
- Let's look at the Surgeon General's website on e-cigarettes (E-cigarettes. Surgeon General.gov) together so you can see for yourself.

I (or my friends) have tried e-cigarettes and it was no big deal.

- I appreciate your honesty. In the future, I hope you (or your friends) will stay away from e-cigarettes and other to bacco products, including cigarettes. Science shows that e-cigarettes contain ingredients that are addictive and could harm different parts of your body.
- Next time we go to the doctor, let's ask about the risks of nicotine, e-cigarettes, and other tobacco products.

You used tobacco, so why shouldn't !?

- If I could live my life over again, I never would have started smoking. I learned that people who smoke cigarettes are much more likely to develop, and die from, certain diseases than people who don't smoke. This was really scary, so I quit smoking.
- Quitting was really hard, and I don't want you to go through that. The best thing is to not start at all.

START THE CONVERSATION

Find the right moment.

- A more natural discussion will increase the likelihood that your teen will listen. Rather than saying "we need to talk," you might ask your teen what he or she thinks about a situation you witness together, such as:
- » Seeing someone use an e-cigarette in person or in a video.
- » Passing an e-cigarette shop when you are walking or driving
- » Seeing an e-cigarette advertisement in a store or magazine or on the interest.

Ask for support.

- . Not sure where to begin? Ask your health care provider to talk to your teen about the risks of e-cigarettes.
- You might also suggest that your teen talk with other trusted adults, such as relatives, teachers, faith leaders, coaches, or counselors whom you know are aware of the risks of e-cigarettes.
- These supportive adults can help reinforce your message as a parent.



Here are some questions and comments you might get from your teen about e-cigarettes and some ideas about how you can answer them.

Why don't you want me to use e-cigarettes?

- Science shows that e-cigarettes contain ingredients that are addictive and could harm different parts of your body.
- Right now, your brain is still developing, which means you are more vulnerable to addiction. Many e-digarettes contain incotine, and using nicotine can change your brain to make you crave more nicotine. It can also affect your memory and concentration. I don't want that for you!
- E-cigarettes contain chemicals that are harmful.
 When people use e-cigarettes, they breathe in tiny particles that can harm their lungs.
- The cloud that people exhale from e-cigarettes can expose you to chemicals that are not safe to breathe.

What's the big deal about nicotine?

- Your brain is still developing until about age 25. The Surgeon General reported that nicotine is addictive and can harm your brain development.
- Using nicotine at your age may make it harder for you to concentrate, learn, or control your impulses
- Nicotine can even train your brain to be more easily addicted to other drugs like meth and cocaine.

Internet Safety and Online Privacy

In today's world, where sharing is becoming the norm, there's a lot of talk about privacy and online reputation. Everything kids say or do online can affect how others view their character. These articles offer parents insight into how companies can collect and use their kids' data and personal information -- and what they can do about it.

Tip: Explain that nothing is really private online.

It's crucial for kids to guard their own online privacy by not posting and sharing things they don't want to become public. A few more tips: Ask permission before you go online. Never share passwords. Keep personal details -- name, address, phone number, how much money your parents make -- to yourself. Think before you post -- is this really something you want to share? Only communicate with people you know -- never chat with or send photos to strangers. (From "Parents' Guide to Protecting Kids' Privacy Online.")

Historic December

Boston Tea Party - December 16, 1773


"Taxation Without Representation"

In an effort to refill their coffers after the French and Indian War, the British began imposing taxes on the colonies. The first tax enacted was the Stamp Act of 1765, which imposed a tax on all paper. The Townshend Acts (1767-68) taxed Colonials on paint, paper, lead, glass and tea. What really lit the fire of the Colonials' ire was the Boston Massacre (March 5, 1770), when a group of angry colonists threw snowballs at British soldiers, who then called for reinforcements and killed 5 colonists. The Brits eventually lifted all the taxes except for the one on tea. The Colonials refused to pay. So, on the night of December 16, they donned costumes (some disguised themselves as Native Americans), and boarded three English tea ships in Boston Harbor. In the dark of the night, they threw overboard all chests of tea in protest. Thus was sparked the American Revolution.



Wright Brothers First Flight - December 17, 1903

Wilbur won the coin toss and piloted their aircraft on its first flight at Kill Devil Hills, near Kitty Hawk, North Carolina. The plane nose-dived into the sand after 3-1/2 seconds. After repairs were made, Orville flew the craft the next day, and soared over the sand dunes for 120 yards in 12 seconds. The brothers made three more flights that day. The last one, with Wilbur at the helm, lasted 59 seconds and covered 852 feet. Ironically, a feisty gust of wind off the ocean tossed the craft upside down on the sand. It never flew again.





The Battle of Wounded Knee - December 12, 1890

Wounded Knee Creek, South Dakota, marked the last conflict between the U.S. Calvary soldiers and the Lakota Nation. One hundred and fifty Native American Sioux were killed, mostly women and children.

The spread of the Ghost Dance, a spiritual dance through which Native Americans thought the world could be made new and they could live in peace without the white man, alarmed U.S. Soldiers. Mistakenly believing that Sitting Bull (who was imprisoned at Pine Ridge) was calling for the dance to be performed, he was assassinated. In the unrest that followed, Big Foot (also known as Spotted Elk, Sitting Bull's brother), led his people on the 300-mile journey to refuge at Wounded Knee. The U.S. 7th Cavalry rode out to Wounded Knee to quell unrest; instead, the infamous massacre ensued.

In 1973, another uprising occurred at Wounded Knee. The American Indian Movement (AIM) occupied Wounded Knee to protest harassment of tribal members. Two Native Americans were killed and a federal marshall was paralyzed by gunfire. Tribal members were arrested, but later acquitted due to FBI manipulation.

The protest succeeded in drawing attention to the plight of the Native Americans.

In the photo, riders recreate Big Foot's 300-mile ride from Pine Ridge Reservation to Wounded Knee.


The Fall of the Soviet Union: December 25, 1991

After nearly 70 years of communist rule, the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics (USSR) crumbled under Mikhail Gorbachev's leadership. Gorbachev introduced "Per-estroika", a policy of economic restructuring and "Glasnost", which created political openness. These policies enabled democratization to spread through Eastern Europe.

Gorbachev resigned on December 25, 1991, announcing: "We're now living in a new world. An end has been put to the Cold War and to the arms race, as well as to the mad militarization of the country, which has crippled our economy, public attitudes and morals."



Note --

"All that Glitters is not Gold", or variations thereof, was first used by 12th-century theologian Alain deLille. Geoffrey Chaucer also used it in 1380 in *House of Fame*. The phrase was popularized by Shakespeare in 1596's *Merchant of Venice*. Tolkien used it here, along with "Not All those Who Wander are Lost", (a popular quote) in "The Riddle of Strider" in 1948's *Lord of the Rings*.



There is truly nothing like a sleigh ride on a winter's day...in the moonlight is even better! The romanticism of a sleigh ride was embodied in the Albany Cutter, first produced in Albany, New York, by the James Goold Company at the turn of the 18th century. Skilled craftsmen steamed the wood to build the swell body and delicately curved runners. Designed for two, it was the trendiest way to get around in winter.

The marine animals are in lots of danger and so are we if we do not do something about it. Also because of the pollution 100,000 marine animals die from plastic waste every year.



The National Football League was founded in 1920. It was started by a group of gathered men in


