<u>Ridge Road Elementary School</u> <u>Students' Materials Pick-up Plan</u> <u>June 16th and 17th</u>

Ridge Road Families!

Tuesday, June 16th and Wednesday, June 17th, will be the scheduled pick-up days for all students to get their materials from Ridge Road School. Each homeroom and grade level will be assigned a time for pick-up. However, please know that you will be able to pick-up the materials for all students in your family at one time based on the oldest child in the school's assigned classroom time.

Example- The Jenkins' family has three students that attend Ridge Road - Josh in 3rd, Kelly in 1st and Jonny in K. The family would pick up materials for all the children at the assigned time they are scheduled to pick up materials for Josh (oldest child in school).

Note for Parents-

We will have a drive-up system and staff will bring your child's bags to your car. No family members will need to get out of the car at any time. Staff will be wearing masks and gloves. Children are welcome to be in the car's back seats or on the passenger side of the car, so the staff can wave at them, hold up signs for them and wish them a happy summer!

4th Grade Students-

We especially want to celebrate with our 4th grade students as this is their last year with us at Ridge Road. When you come to pick-up their materials, we would love to have them in the passenger side of the car to be handed their 4th grade certificate and a small treat with their bag of materials. Ridge Road Staff will be there with signs and banners to wish them well. We would also love to see them wearing their t-shirts they just recently received from the goodie bags.

Pick-up Procedures-

All cars will pull in the back-parking lot and drive up the lane next to the sidewalk and school building main entrance as if they were dropping off students in the morning drop-off lane.

We ask that the name of the oldest child in your family that attends our school be put up in the back-passenger car window for staff on the sidewalk to be able to quickly read. The Ridge Road welcome point staff will be out on the sidewalk with radios. They will call in your family's name to their partner staff member inside the cafeteria with all of the materials.

That staff member will ask you to pull up to one of the designated parking spaces to have your child's/children's materials brought to your car. The partner staff member from inside the cafeteria will be exiting the steps by the café to immediately bring the materials to your car.

Once, you receive the materials, you will be able to pull out of the space moving forward and exit the parking lot by the normal exit that is closer to the ball field and tennis courts.

Yearbooks

Unfortunately, Lifetouch has also been hit with delays and other issues from Covid-19. I had been waiting to schedule the materials pick-up for after the yearbooks had arrived so each student could also get their yearbook with their bag of materials. It now looks like our yearbooks will not be arriving until the end of June or early July. I will reach out to all parents and will schedule a yearbook distribution after their arrival.

District Technology

If you have borrowed laptops or iPads from the district, they will be collected the week of June 22nd. The District Technology Director is setting up the return procedures for all technology and will be reaching out to all parents soon. Please know that we will not be able to accept any returns of technology equipment at Ridge Road on the 16th or 17th.

Budget Vote/Board Election by Absentee Ballot This Year

In accordance with New York State Governor Andrew Cuomo's Executive Order, the Horseheads Central School District will hold the 2020-21 Budget Vote/Board of Education Election via absentee ballot only.

Ballots will be mailed to those eligible voters who voted in the 2019 annual vote. In addition, applications for absentee ballots may also be applied for at the office of the District Clerk for any qualified voter in the district who did not vote in the 2019 annual vote. Contact the District Clerk at 607-739-5601 ext. 4260 to schedule an appointment to complete the application for a ballot to be mailed to you. Such applications for an absentee ballot must be received by the District Clerk at least seven days before the vote if the ballot is to be mailed to the absentee voter or the day before the vote if the ballot s must be received by scheduled appointment at the district office. Absentee ballots must be received in the office of the District Clerk, 143 Hibbard Road, Horseheads, NY 14845, not later than 5 p.m. on June 9 in order to be counted.

All district residents are eligible to vote, as long as they meet the following requirements:

- Are a U.S. citizen
- Are 18 years of age or older on the day of the vote
- Have lived in the district for at least 30 days prior to the vote
- Are not restricted from voting in general elections based on election law


