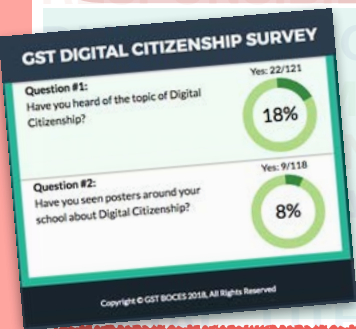

TAKE ACTION BY STANDING UP RATHER THAN WALKING OUT



Recently, students in schools all over the country organized a walk out to protest incidents of school violence and to encourage lawmakers to develop tougher gun control laws.

The show of solidarity among the students was a powerful sign to politicians that young people will soon be voting to change the wrongs that they see before them.

WE ENCOURAGE YOU TO STAND UP AGAINST ONLINE BULLYING.

Be an UPSTANDER rather than a bystander when it comes bullying. Organize your friends and classmates to stand up and have the courage to say "BULLYING IS NOT OK WITH ME - WE DON'T ACCEPT IT IN OUR SCHOOL - HERE WE STAND UP TO BULLIES!"

Talk to the teachers, counselors, and administrators at your school and get their support to organize a STAND UP TO BULLYING DAY (OR WEEK). Just think, if you could get enough people to stand up, you could end bullying (online and otherwise) in your school and your community.

You can make a difference just by following these three simple steps:

1. First, PLEDGE that you will not participate in the bullying of other people in any form.
2. Second, STAND UP for yourself and report any bullying that you experience to your parents, school officials, and if necessary to law enforcement.
3. Third, STAND UP for others if you witness them being bullied at home, at school, or at public events.

WHAT NOT TO SHARE ON SOCIAL MEDIA

Inappropriate Personal Images/Selfies , Social Security Number, Bank Information or Account Names/Numbers

Most People are aware of these items already. Don't let identity thieves steal from you.

Your Personal Location, Details of Your Upcoming Vacation, Geotagged images

Thieves may try to break in if they know you are away. Muggers can track and target you by your location.

Videos of Your Friends That You Took Without Permission, Stuff Your Friends Should Really Be Sharing Themselves, Silly Party Pics

Your friends won't stay friendly if you are sharing info that they want to be private. Your images may cause you trouble.

Complaints About Your School, Teachers, Parents, etc. , Rants about Political or Other Hot Button topics, Unsubstantiated Accusations about Other People, Off-Color (or Insensitive) Jokes

There are lots of people who like to start trash-talking arguments online. We call them trolls. You can lose a lot by angering a troll who may hurl insults or threats at you. Some comments have even lead to being stalked by trolls.

Snapchat?

Many people know that **SnapChat** is an app that can post pictures and videos that disappear after a few seconds, but did you know that there is a lot more to SnapChat?

You can **swipe right** to access the Friends screen where you can chat with friends.

You can **swipe left** to access the Discover screen. The Discover screen has lots of video stories from current news sources.

You can **swipe up** to access the Memories section where you can store images and videos online. You can even back up your phone's camera roll to SnapChat.

It is worth taking a few minutes to look through some of the settings to ensure that your info is shared with the appropriate people. The private settings are very important. Check out this parent's guide from **ConnectSafely.org**.

TALKING TO YOUR KIDS ABOUT THEIR DIGITAL LIFE AND BOUNDARIES

It is important for parents to talk about technology use with their children because although the kids may be sophisticated in their knowledge of how tech things work, they may lack the maturity, judgement, and restraint necessary to keep themselves from making bad decisions.

Some parents know that technology can act as a great babysitter and keep kids busy for hours but parents may not know exactly what their child is doing during that time. Parents need to know what apps, services, and websites their child may be using, and what kinds of activities they are doing while using these programs.

Your children may feel that you are sticking your nose in to their business or breaching their entitlement to online privacy but don't be put off. Let them know that you are doing it in a caring and concerned way and that you want to understand what they are doing with their devices in the online world.

Here are some suggestions of possible questions you can use to start the dialogue with your child:

- What can I do to support or help you be a good digital citizen?
- What don't I really understand about your social networking or online communication with others online?
- What don't I really understand about your gaming?
- What can you tell me which might make me feel more reassured about my concern about X?
- How would you look after yourself or act in safe ways if X problem occurred?
- Can we agree on a family contract to ensure that technology is being used safely?

The conversation may be painful at first, but don't give up. You have a right to know as a parent what your child is involved with online. If your child doesn't want to talk about this, seek out the counselor, or administrators at your school to see what they may be able to do to help you.

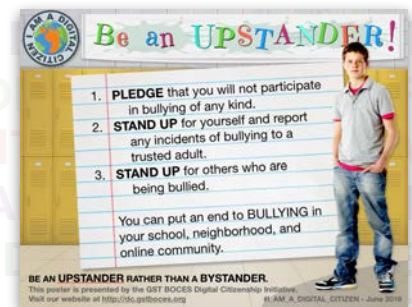
